## Gen. Creighton Abrams Dead At 59

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, the general who took command of U.S. forces in Vietnam at a time of crisis in 1968 and oversaw the policy reversal that led to American withdrawal, died early today. Abrams, who first won fame as a tough tank commander in World War II, died of cancer at 59 on Sept. 3.

The Army announced that he died at 12:35 a.m. EDT at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Mrs. Abrams and his six children, including two Army officers, were at his bedside. His death resulted from complications that developed during recovery from surgical removal of his cancerous lung on June 6, the Army said.

Secretary of the Army Howard M. Callaway issued a statement saying that "the Army and the country have lost one of the great men... of modern times."

Released from the hospital, he returned to the Pentagon on July 25. But Abrams was back at Walter Reed on Aug. 21 when he was described as a blood clot in the leg.

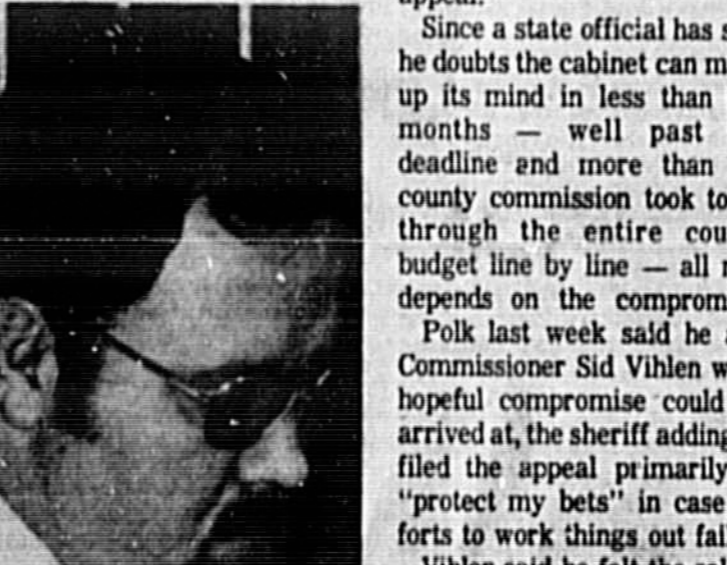
Marsee said today if the state delays beyond the Oct. 1, start of the county's fiscal year, the county can

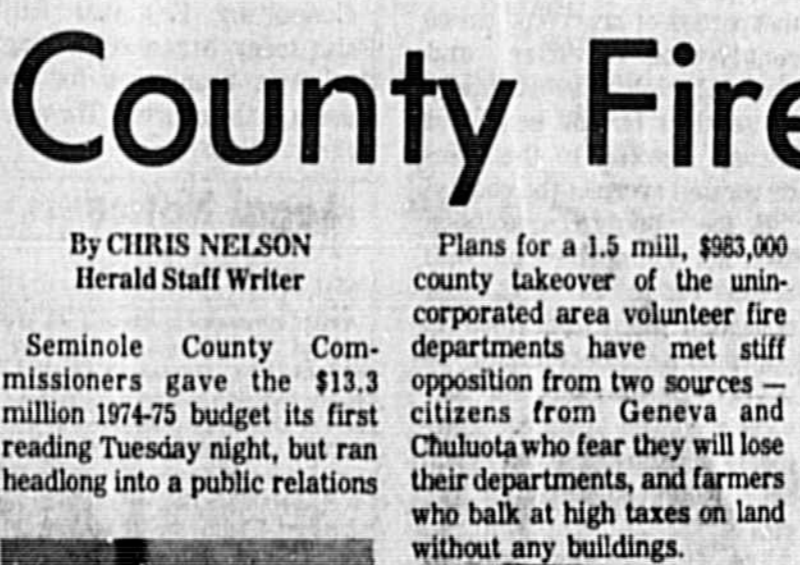

## County Fire Tax Fight Smolders

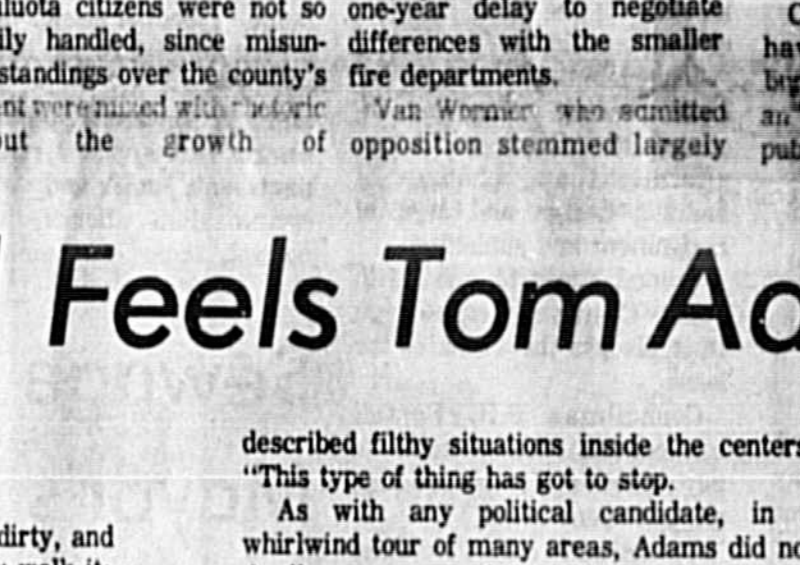
Plans for a \$1.5 million, 1983 county takeover of an unincorporated area volunteer fire departments have met stiff opposition from two sources — citizens from Geneva and Chuluota who fear they will lose their departments, and farmers who balk at high taxes on land without any buildings.

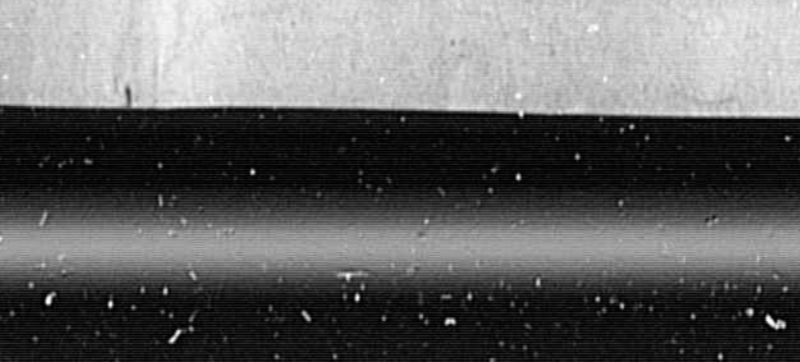

# NATION IN BRIEF

## Loan Official Owes \$318,254

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (AP) — A \$318,254 judgment has been ordered against the former president of the bankrupt Diversified Mountaineer Corporation, but a Dunbar attorney says he's not sure whether the official involved can pay the money back.

U.S. District Judge Charles Fulton of West Palm Beach, Fla., entered the judgment against Theodore R. Price. Price now lives in Jimo Beach, Fla.

The Charleston Gazette today quoted federal trustee Carl Duttine as saying he knows of no assets that Price might have to pay off the debt. The \$318,254 judgment includes the unpaid balance of \$300,000 Price borrowed before leaving the firm, plus some advance commissions he had collected and other fees and interest.

## Mayor Daley Back To Work

CHICAGO (AP) — Mayor Richard J. Daley is back in business at the same old stand and gives every indication he'll like to be there for four more years.

Daley, 71, returned to his fifth floor office in City Hall on Tuesday for the first time since he suffered a stroke on May 6.

In the four months Daley has been convalescing at his summer home in Grand Beach, Mich., there has been speculation that poor health would force him from politics and the mayor's post he has held since 1956.

But Daley, trimmer by 25 pounds, said if he had to decide now on an unprecedented sixth four-year term, the answer would be yes.

Daley, the nation's top big city political leader for the past two decades, said there were no health problems standing in the way of his candidacy in next April's election. He said his family had left the decision on another term "entirely up to me."

## Dean Starts 1-Year Term

WASHINGTON (AP) — John W. Dean III has begun serving a minimum one-year jail sentence for his part in covering up the Watergate scandal, but his role as a major source of Watergate evidence is not over.

The former White House counsel will testify in the Watergate cover-up trial scheduled to begin Sept. 30. Federal officials say he will remain available for any other investigations by Special Watergate Prosecutor Leon Jaworski.

While Dean continues to provide evidence, he will remain in the custody of U.S. marshals to whom he surrendered Tuesday.

Dean was driven to the U.S. courthouse by a deputy marshal who had picked up the 35-year-old disgraced lawyer at a Washington hotel. Before formally surrendering to Chief U.S. Marshal George K. McKinney, Dean walked through a throng of newsmen.

## Oil Prices Subject Of Candidates

Two candidates for the Democratic nomination to the state Senate have criticized the oil interests as they entered the final days of their campaigns.

Speaking in Jacksonville, Richard Pettigrew called for federal board to regulate the oil industry.

He said creation of such a board would lower oil prices, "end outrageous profits the giants have made at public expense over the past year," and insure that oil supplies are fairly distributed while alternate energy sources are developed.

Also in a Jacksonville appearance, U.S. Rep. Bill Gunter criticized a letter in last Friday's Washington Post in which Gunter contended a Venezuelan embassy official said "exorbitant oil prices actually are good for consumers."

"I am personally inviting the ambassador and any of his staff he would care to bring, to come to Florida and personally defend the oil price gouging of Venezuela," he said.

Another candidate, Richard Stone, campaigning in Tampa, said consumers should question "Why interest rates are 10 to 11 per cent while at the same time agencies of the United States Government are lending money to foreign nations at six to eight per cent interest."

He urged consumers to write letters to the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve Board demanding lower interest rates.

On the Republican side, Public Service Commissioner Paula Hawkins said in a statement for a Palm Beach audience that the federal government has turned a deaf ear to ordinary citizens.

"If you're Lockheed Aircraft and about to go under because of poor management, good Uncle Sam will lend you the money," she said. "But if you're just plain folks... then your federal government has no time for you."

Another Democrat, Mallory Horne, predicted in Tallahassee that he will win a runoff berth opposite Stone or Pettigrew.

# Lester Maddox Loses Election

Lester Maddox, a symbol of Southern segregationist defiance a decade ago, has lost his bid to become Georgia's governor for the second time.

Maddox, 59, who led a 15-candidate field in the Democratic primary on Aug. 13, was defeated in the runoff on Tuesday by state Rep. George Busbee, who had the support of black civil rights leaders.

"People are quicker to turn out to vote against somebody than they are to vote for somebody," a fearful Maddox told

campaign workers. Busbee, 47-year-old majority leader of the Georgia house, said after winning by a comfortable margin: "I do think people have made it clear they want four years of sound, stable government."

In addition to the Georgia runoff, primary elections were held Tuesday in North Dakota and Nevada.

Maddox had served as governor from 1967 to 1971, then was elected lieutenant governor under a Georgia law prohibiting a governor from succeeding himself. The governor for the last four years has been Jimmy

Carter, a moderate considered one of the leaders of "The New South" of white and black cooperation.

Maddox's career was forged a decade ago when as owner of Atlanta's Pickrick Restaurant he became a symbol of southern resistance to integration by issuing clubs to his employees. The clubs were used to drive away blacks and college students responding to patronage.

In the Republican gubernatorial primary, Harold Dye, a retired Army officer from Atlanta, held a slim lead over Macon Mayor Ronnie Thompson, a law-and-order candidate who once gave "shoot to kill" orders to his police in a crackdown on crime.

In Nevada, former Gov. Paul Laxalt easily captured the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate seat held by Democrat Alan Bible, who is retiring. Laxalt will face Lt. Gov. Harry Reid, who won a three-way fight for the Democratic nomination. His main challenger was Maya Miller, a political newcomer who campaigned as an environmentalist.

## Seventeen Hurt In Jersey Unrest

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Sniper fire and looting marked a third straight day of disorders in New Jersey's largest city. Police said 17 officers and five civilians received minor injuries.

Relative calm returned to this city of 400,000 about midnight on Tuesday.

Police said about 15 stores, including a five-and-dime and a small department store, were looted on Tuesday and Tuesday night as bands of youths, most of them Puerto Rican, rampaged through the predominantly white North Ward. Authorities said that at one time, a squad of eight policemen investigating a report of looting at a liquor store came under sniper fire. Police said six shots were fired but none of the officers was hit. They withdrew without returning the fire, police said.

The violence was centered in a 12-block square area around Columbus Homes, a city-owned, low-income housing project where most of the residents are Puerto Rican.

Police said that in the three days of violence they have arrested 76 persons, including 31 on Tuesday. The charges included disturbing the peace, burglary, breaking and entering, possession of stolen goods, theft and assault on a police officer.

Fifty-four persons have been injured, authorities said. The disorders started on Sunday when police broke up a dice game at a Puerto Rican picnic in Branch Brook Park. Two persons were shot, two police cars and a motorcycle were burned and other vehicles were damaged in an ensuing melee.

On Monday, about 1,000 demonstrators marched on City Hall to protest what they claimed was police brutality in quelling the Sunday disturbance. Spokesmen demanded of Mayor Kenneth A. Gibson that he dismiss Police Director Herbert A. Williams and establish a community-selected police review board.

**COOKING IS FUN**

Some of the finest food served today in my opinion is in the kosher tradition, featuring a cuisine that has always fascinated me.

It's no way to lose weight and some people complain about blandness, but to me a Jewish-cooked meal is a delight from the challah bread to the gefilte fish with horseradish and finally a dessert like chocolate sour cream cake.

Now the Ladies' Auxiliary of Temple Beth Israel has come out with a timeless collection called "Best of Jewish Cooking" that offers a stunning variety of dishes associated with Jewish lore; specialties for the Sabbath, the High Holidays and other holy days.

Enjoyment of life plays a large part in Jewish tradition, Jewish foods are closely linked to Jewish history; like the matzo's Israelite housewives had to whip up in a hurry for the flight from Egypt. Or the grated potato pancakes which appear during Chanukah, commemorating the triumph of the Jews in driving the enemy out of their temple in Jerusalem.

One interesting festival is the Feast of the Passover, recalling the night when God, smiting the first-born of the Egyptians, "passed over" the houses of the children of Israel. A recipe for this day gives the formula for charoses, a mixture of apples, nuts and wine that symbolizes the mortar used by Jewish slaves in Egypt.

Many of these festival dishes are gourmet fare, like the chicken breasts and cherries cooked in wine and served at the feast before the fast of Yom Kippur.

3 chicken breasts split in half  
Kosher salt  
Freshly ground pepper  
1/4 cup pure vegetable shortening

1 clove garlic, chopped  
1 medium onion, sliced  
1/4 lb. sliced mushrooms  
1/4 cup chicken broth  
1/4 cup kosher dry white wine  
1 cup pitted dark cherries

# Oatmeal Cookies Can Be Big, Soft

Big and soft oldtime oatmeal cookies

**DEAR CECILY:** I like to bake thin crisp oatmeal cookies. But my husband says his mother made big, soft, fat ones and that's what he'd like to taste again. Can you give me a recipe for these? —PLEASING WIFE.

**DEAR PLEASING WIFE:** I hope the following recipe fits the bill. If not, let me know and I'll try again. —C.B.

**MEMORY COOKIES**  
3 cups flour, fork-stir well to aerate before measuring.  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon ginger  
1/2 cup shortening, soft  
1/2 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar  
1 egg  
1/2 cup molasses  
1/2 cup buttermilk  
1 1/2 cups quick-cooking oats

Lemon Frosting, see below

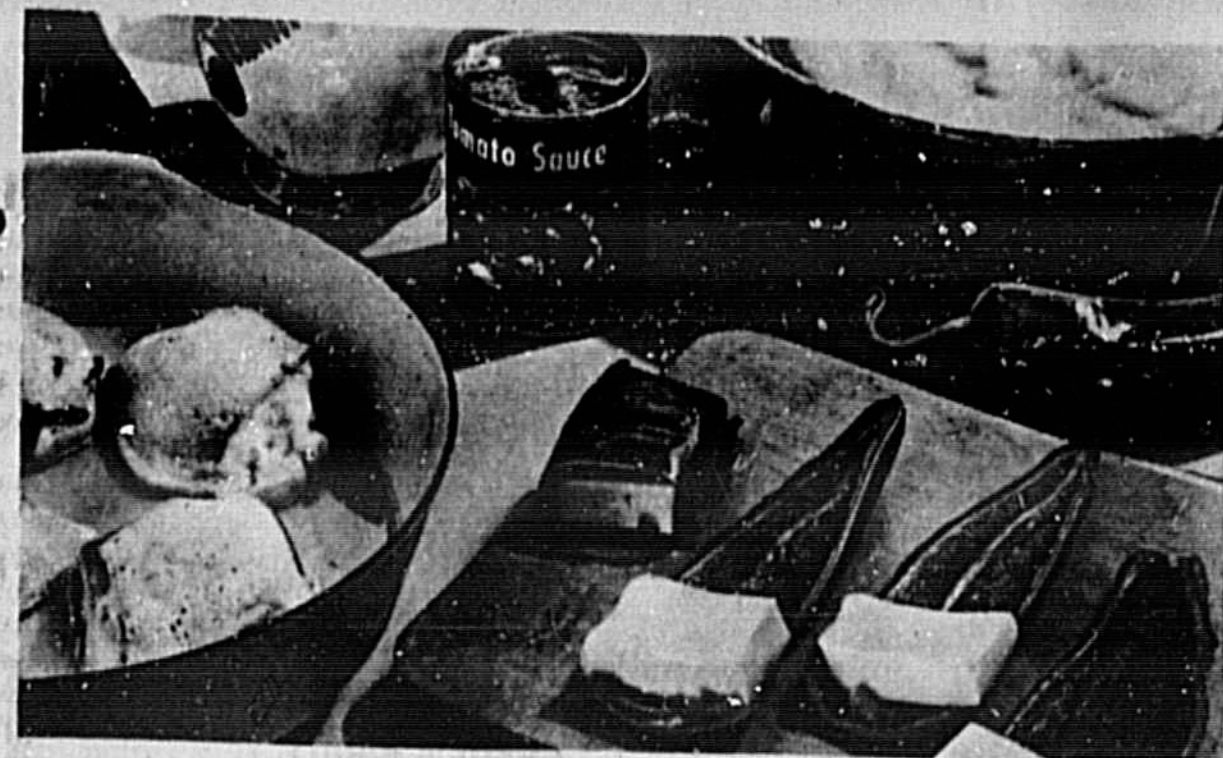
In a large mixing bowl thoroughly stir together the flour, baking soda, salt and ginger. Add shortening, sugar, eggs, molasses and buttermilk. Beat until blended. Stir in oats. Tightly cover and chill for 2 to 24 hours. Divide dough in half and work with 1 portion at a

time, keeping the other half refrigerated. On a floured pastry cloth, with a floured stockinced-covered rolling pin, roll out dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut out with a floured 3-inch round cookie cutter. With a wide metal spatula, transfer cookies to greased cookie sheets so they are a few inches apart. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven 10 to 12 minutes. Remove to wire racks to cool. Pipe Lemon Frosting in a spiral design onto each cookie or drizzle on with a teaspoon. If cookies are made ahead and frozen, do not frost until after cookies are removed from freezer and thawed.

Makes 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 dozen.

Lemon Frosting: Beat together until smooth 1 cup confectioner's sugar and enough lemon juice (about 1 tablespoon) to make good consistency to use in a decorator's tube or drop from a teaspoon.

# Meatless Supper Is From Mexico

In late summer and early fall, slim, tapered, mild green chile peppers — sometimes called frying peppers — come into markets. Lighter in color than the Bell or Globe green pepper, they are usually from four to six inches long.

They can make a thrifty main course for a meatless supper when you treat them in Mexican fashion: stuff with cheese, dip in batter, fry and meat in tomato sauce. Along

with this dish called Chile Rellenos con Queso, we like to offer — in south of the border style — yellow rice or pink beans (or both) and tortillas. A tossed green salad and fruit rounds out the menu economically.

The following recipe for Chile Rellenos con Queso departs from Mexican technique in one particular. Up to now we've followed tradition and broiled the peppers until the skins blistered and then peeled them before stuffing. This takes time. Recently we were told

enough to omit this step and were pleased with the result. If you try this recipe, we hope you will be, too.

**CHILES RELLENOS CON QUESO**  
4 sweet green chile peppers, generous 1/2 pound or similar mild white cheese in 1 piece, cut into 8 equal squares  
2 eggs, separated  
2 tablespoons flour  
Pinch of salt  
Oil for frying

In a saucepan cover chiles with water; bring to a boil, boil gently until soft — about 10 minutes; drain. Cut away stem ends, cut in half lengthwise and discard seeds. Place a square of cheese at the end of each chile, half and roll up. Lightly coat chiles with extra flour, shaking off excess.

Start heating oil (at least 1 1/2 inches deep) to 375 degrees. In a medium mixing bowl beat egg whites until stiff, add just hot through. Coating, if deflated, should puff again. Serve at once.

Makes 4 small servings.

**TOMATO SAUCE**  
1 tablespoon oil  
Medium onion, chopped  
6-ounce can tomato sauce  
Vegetable bouillon cube  
1/2 cup water  
Pinch of ground cloves  
Pinch of ground cinnamon

In a 10-inch skillet heat the oil; add the onion and cook gently, stirring often, until wilted. Add remaining ingredients; bring to simmering, stirring to dissolve vegetable bouillon cube; simmer about 5 minutes. Cover and let stand until ready to heat the Chile Rellenos con Queso in this sauce as directed.

Series Kids Will Change

HOLLYWOOD "I don't want to end up like 'Room 222' with a bunch of 30-year-old sophomores," producer David Levinson explained.

And that's why he has changed the title of his new fall series on CBS from "Senior Year" to "Sons and Daughters."

With which teen-agers of the '50s were saddled. His central characters are a pair of high-school seniors in 1955—a girl whose parents are split and a boy whose father used leaving him with a dependent mother.

"Yeah, I know it sounds like soap opera," Levinson said. "But the only way to protect against prime-time soap opera is with very good writing. The only difference between soap and drama is the writing. For example: 'Death of a Salesman.'"

"I remember 'Rebel Without a Cause' as a sort of battle cry then. Now, you see it on the late show and it's laughable."

Levinson said the sexual hangups of the 1950s will be a major factor in the series "by the grace of the CBS Standards and Practices Department."

Headed, "I recall the '50s as a period with a great deal of talk about sex and little practice. Of course, the CBS censors believe kids really were brought by the stork."

"It was a horrible period for kids. If a girl wanted to hold onto a guy, she was afraid to hold out. But if she said, 'Go ahead,' he was scared and didn't know what to do."

"Well, go into sex, but we won't go to war weekly with the CBS censors," he added. "The problems of puberty are always a problem in any time," Frank injected, from a viewpoint of someone who passed that period more recently than Levinson.

"In the 1960s, there was the decline of the middle class. In the 1950s, there was definitely a middle class and these kids (in the show) are definitely middle class."
