Rapid Rail approval
The Casselberry City Commission has officially announced approval of commuter rail. According to a resolution passed on March 6, the city supports "the possibility of utilizing a financially feasible commuter rail as an additional means of public transportation." The city said it wishes to participate with other counties and cities in the planning process for commuter rail in Central Florida.

Vehicle inspection
The Florida Highway Patrol will be conducting Driver's License and Vehicle Inspection Checkpoints in Seminole County from March 17 through April 20. Troopers will concentrate their efforts on vehicles being operated with defects such as bad brakes, worn tires and defective lighting equipment. In addition, attention will be directed to drivers who would violate the driver license laws of Florida.

The FHP will conduct the checkpoints at ten different locations each week, many in the Sanford area including Celery Avenue, Kendall, Marquette, SR-415, Old Lake Mary Road, Lake Mary Blvd., and many others.

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Ax murderer confesses

Buzia says he waited for victims inside their home

ax, killing the husband and leaving the wife critically injured.

He stole cash, credit cards and a car from the couple, Seminole County Sheriff Don Eisinger said. The attack was motivated by the robbery. Although declining to describe the injuries inflicted upon the

couple, Eisinger said the attack was "particularly brutal."

Buzia found the ax in the garage of the couple's home, located in the gated Riverwalk neighborhood just north of the University of Central Florida.

"As a murder has kind of become a


standard we use to compare crimes in this country," Eisinger said. "It doesn't get any worse than this."

The Kersch was the first to arrive home. Buzia attacked her, left her for dead, then assaulted Charles Kersch when he arrived. The attacks occurred in the living room and back porch areas of the home, Eisinger said.

"After he assaulted her, he says that he wandered about the house until the husband arrived," Eisinger said. "We also have evidence to show he did that."

House OKs airport funds; bill now needs Clinton's signature

SANFORD — The U.S. House of Representatives on Wednesday passed a bill which would double federal funding for airports nationwide, including the Orlando Sanford Airport.

President Bill Clinton has 10 days to sign the Federal Aviation Administration Authorization Bill, setting federal spending levels for airports.

The House approved the bill Wednesday by a vote of 319-101. The Senate already had

As a result, airports nationwide have not received new federal grants since Oct. 1, 1999.

Victor White, director of the Orlando Sanford Airport, said an increase in federal funding may enable the airport to proceed on several projects that had been placed temporarily on hold because of delays in receiving federal grant funding.

Opposition to the bill has

Florida natives can get certificate from county historical society

Are you a real Florida native? Would you like to prove it to all those newcomers? The Seminole County Historical Society is offering you a way. If you can trace your roots in the county back before April 25, 1913, they'll certify you!

Why 1913? Until 1913, Seminole County was part of Orange County. (Both started out as part of Mosquito County.) Becoming a certified native was the brainchild of Seminole County Historical Society President Charlie Carlson. The "Certificate of Heritage" is available to anyone in Seminole County who can

show proof of their heritage. Simply fill out the application form with the documentation of your family's heritage, and include an application fee of \$10 for the first certificate and \$5 for each certificate within the same family group.

Lake Mary Historical Commissioner Lillian Griffin will be among the first to receive Native Certification. Her family will be getting a total of seven certificates.

What constitutes proof of heritage? A copy of a census report, a city directory, a postal record, an obituary, church record, military record, news article, genealogical record, land record or any other document that shows an address or other proof of residency for your forefathers (or mothers).

You can get an application through most historical societies or museums, or by contacting the Seminole County Historical Society, Attention Heritage Committee, P.O. Box 409, Sanford, Fla. 32772-0409.

Besides being a great opportunity to tell your friends that you're "certifiable," it's also a great opportunity to make sure your ancestors' histories become part of the official county history.

Tour scam has artists singing sour notes

Promoter promised 'Juice Tour' would travel the nation

SANFORD — Sanford police are looking into allegations that a Sanford businessman ran a scam by promoting a musical tour which turned out to be a fraud.

The Sanford Police Department, as well as the Better Business Bureau, has received several complaints regarding Everywhere Promotions and Marketing, Inc., and Sanford-based promoter Tyler Simpson.

The allegations stem from the promotion of the Juice Tour 2000, which was promoted as featuring the best models, dancers, and artists worldwide. It was to leave on a tour of the United States on Sunday, March 12, promoted by Simpson and an associate, Anthony Brooks.

Investigators said that about 100 people paid a minimum of \$300 for insurance that was apparently never obtained.

On Sunday the models, dancers and artists showed up at the Wal-Mart Plaza in Sanford to meet with the tour buses. However, the buses never showed up. A representative of Simpson arrived and told them that the bus would leave on Tuesday, but it never did, said investigator Greg Tyler Simpson.

It makes cents

What do you do with pennies? If pennies are from heaven, as the song says, there must be some earthly way to get rid of them.

Many people, at the end of each day take pennies out of their pockets, purses or coin holders, and put them in a jar. Eventually, the jar is full and one gets the urge to dispose of them. How?

Banks won't take them unless they are rolled into groups of 40. Counting them and placing them in these paper holders is a tedious job. And this count by just one penny.

There you are, back to step one.

Some of the old adages say,

"Denny for your thoughts" or "A penny saved is a penny earned."

For some reason, it's impossible to imagine either. Have you ever given anyone an actual cent piece to hear what they are thinking?

Do you honestly believe saving a penny is the same as earning money?

Fifty pennies saved may take five to ten minutes to count and put in these holders. When you consider the time it takes, plus hauling them to a bank and waiting until the teller weighs them, are you really getting your money's worth?

Every once in awhile, someone

in authority comes up with a call to eliminate pennies. Round everything out to the nearest five cents, and use nickels. Then maybe people will get rid of those jars filled with pennies. Only what happens? We end up with jars full of nickels which weigh more, and will still have to be counted before taking them to the bank to exchange them for paper money.

There was recently a case where an angry woman, forced by a court to pay \$100,000 to her former husband (for some reason or another), paid it in pennies. We can't even imaging how much that amount weighed - and this is rare. But we've heard of other angry people who object to paying taxes and send pennies.

We would hope that some day, more well thinking financial institutions will have the public in mind and allow people to bring a bag of pennies without having to roll them. The institution sorts them, weighs them, and returns paper money in exchange. That would be nice.

Until then, however, this problem with getting rid of pennies just doesn't make sense.

Rail officials seek \$30 million expansion of Sanford station

SANFORD — Auto Train officials are proposing a \$30-million expansion within the Rand Yard area of Sanford.

The plan calls for Amtrak, Auto Train, a commuter rail station, bus service and an airport shuttle at a single location. U.S. Congressman John Mica (R-Winter Park) said construction could begin at the facility by the end of the year.

Mica is a ranking member of the congressional committee that controls federal transportation funding.

"Auto Train delivered the plan to me earlier this month," Mica said. "I am certainly excited about it. I think it would be a tremendous boon for the region."

Prior to this month, an \$18-million expansion plan called for the Auto Train and Amtrak facilities to be relocated to the Rand Yard area as a new intermodal transportation facility, providing bus and rail service.

Despite her wounds, Thera Kersch managed to call 911. When investigators arrived, she uttered Buzia's name as the one who made the attack, then she collapsed.

She also mouthed Buzia's name Wednesday morning, despite being heavily sedated on medication at Orlando Regional Medical Center, where she remains in stable condition.

"It is remarkable that she survived and remained conscious enough and responsive enough to utter his name," Eslinger said.

Investigators found blood stains on the clothes and body of Buzia linking him to the attack when they arrested him. In addition, blood stains were found within the couple's stolen car.

At about 8:30 a.m. Wednesday Buzia attempted to cash a forged \$850 check in the drive-in lane of the National Commerce Bank located at 2200 Aloma Avenue in Winter Park before the bank was open.

A teller recognized the license plate of the couple's stolen 1993 Toyota Camry as published in news reports, and called the Winter Park police.

"We appreciate her intuitiveness and willingness to get involved and do the right thing," Eslinger said of the teller, who he declined to identify. "This is the type of cooperation with the community that law enforcement depends upon."

Winter Park police had Buzia in custody at 8:45 a.m.

"He said he had not been watching the news reports, and did not know of the notoriety the case had received," Eslinger said.

Buzia lived in the Pine Hills area. However, he has not had a permanent address since Thursday of last week.

Investigators do not know how long Buzia had known the couple. However, Eslinger said Buzia had been performing work for the couple as a handyman the previous three days.

Buzia has an extensive criminal record which includes possession of drug paraphernalia and DUI. However, he denies

The proposal presented to Mica this month is an extension of earlier plans.

The station would be built on the north side of State Road 46 where two CSX rail lines meet. Amtrak would purchase the Rand Yard property from CSX Transportation.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale informed the Sanford City Commission about the possibility of the \$30 million project.

"This would be great for Sanford," Dale said. "It would bring in more people to the area."

The city is already working with Seminole County and the State Department of Transportation on plans to expand roads in the area. In addition, plans call for an extension of water and sewer service to the area.

Auto Train officials are exploring the super-station concept as part of plans to build a new southern terminal. Work on a new station at the company's northern terminus in Lorton, Va., is nearing completion.

According to the proposed budget, the cost of buying the property for the Amtrak station, relocating track, utilities, planning and construction would be about \$12 million. Another \$12 million would be used to build an Auto Train super-station with its amenities.

The proposal calls for completion of the project within 18 to 24 months following land acquisition. Work could begin by the end of the year.

A Rand Yard expansion of between \$18 million and \$30 million will occur regardless of whether Mica's commuter rail proposal is successful. However, locating a commuter rail station in Sanford would lead to greater expansion of Rand Yard, Mica said.

Under the proposal, by late 2002 or early 2003 a 52-mile commuter rail system would run from southwest Volusia County to the Orlando International Airport, with a 10-mile extension to Kissimmee.

come primarily over a proposed raise in the passenger facility charge from \$3 per passenger to \$4.50. The majority of Airport Improvement Program funds come from the Aviation Trust Fund, which is funded through the collection of an airplane ticket tax.

The Aviation Trust Fund can be used exclusively for aviation purposes, including airport runways, facilities and construction. It cannot be used for debt relief.

"Most trust funds, including social security and highway and airport funds, in the past have been diverted to general funds, and used for purposes they were not intended to be used," said Congressman John Mica (R-

Winter Park). "This bill ensures that the funds will be dedicated to the services for which they were intended."

Mica is a member of the Aviation Subcommittee which developed the authorization bill.

Meanwhile, as a result of the delays, the long-term debt of the Orlando Sanford Airport has unexpectedly ballooned to \$153 million.

The Sanford Airport Authority Board in February agreed to hold off on starting new capital projects until a payment plan is in place for projects already underway.

Construction is in progress on \$30 million worth of projects at the airport, including a \$25 million expansion of the domestic

terminal facilities. Funds for these projects have been set aside, and construction will not be delayed.

Sanford's airport is not alone in facing difficulties in funding capital projects. Airports nationwide have also delayed new projects because of delays in receiving grants.

Debt is a particularly important issue at the Daytona Beach International Airport, which used bond financing to construct a new terminal.

Mica secured an exemption within the authorization bill which allows Daytona's airport to use Airport Improvement Program funding to pay off its debt.



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

New Chevy rules will be tested this week

The stage is set for a Darlington classic, and Ford drivers Jeff Burton and Dale Jarrett may have their hands full this weekend with suddenly feisty Chevy drivers.

Dale Earnhardt, who won Sunday's Cracker Barrel 500 by a nose, used to dominate Darlington with an aggressive style that was little short of stunning, and he still has more career wins at the legendary South Carolina track than any other driver except David Pearson. A win in Sunday's Mall com 400 would tie them with 10 wins.

Jeff Gordon's Darlington touch once was celebrated, too, with his four straight wins in the Southern 500. But Darlington has been one of Jeff Burton's best tracks recently, so NASCAR's new Chevy rules change should get a rigorous test this weekend. The problem in analyzing NASCAR's "Chevy bumper" rule is that Burton and Jarrett, two of Ford's three biggest stars, weren't around for the finish of Sunday's race. A right-rear tire exploded on Burton's car 100 miles into the race, and Jarrett lost an engine with 100 miles to go after falling behind after a pit-road collision.

Another problem was Goodyear's "wiggly" new tires, which made many drivers simply uncomfortable.

Burton's championship hopes are on the rocks, at the moment, with bad runs in two of the year's first four races, including Sunday's blown tire while challenging for the lead. Jarrett's bid for a repeat took a hit, too, with his blown engine, which resulted in his first DNF in more than a year.

After berating the media before Sunday's race for writing about "boring" races, Jarrett may come into Darlington with a chip on his shoulder and something to prove — that General Motors stars Earnhardt and Bobby Labonte aren't the only men who can make things exciting on the track.

The perfect finish for NASCAR officials, of course, would be for all three makes to come off the fourth turn side by side on the last lap. And Pontiac's Labonte and Chevrolet's Earnhardt did their part for the cause here Sunday, in the most exciting finish of the year.

Sunday's gong marked the first time this year that a Chevrolet driver, Mike Skinner, led the most laps.

After a lengthening string of less-than-thrilling races, stretching back to last season, NASCAR officials were clearly jubilant. Not only was it a great race, but Chevy, Pontiac and Ford placed in the top three for the first time since last summer. Chevy's Gordon has been in a slump, so Sunday's ninth-place finish was a relief.

"We had something that was capable of winning," Gordon said. "Mike Skinner was dominant, especially on short runs. [Bobby] Labonte seemed to be able to run him down on long runs. But my car was so good there at the end, I would have liked to have been on the lead lap with them. We could have had some fun."

"Don't evaluate the racing on just three races ... and don't evaluate my season on just three races."

But NASCAR re-evaluated the Chevrolet after just three races. "But they knew before we even started the year that we were in trouble," Gordon said. "I think Darlington will be a better judge of the new rules."

Gordon may be the real reason for the Monte Carlo's early season problems, because NASCAR scrutinized the new Chevrolet design last spring for fear that Gordon, who had won 13 races and the title the year before, would take the new car and keep chipping away at the competition. NASCAR required it come into specification about 10 percent worse than last year's Chevrolet. Now NASCAR and Chevrolet are both working at catching back up, under the eye of not-so-happy Ford teams.

Ford men were a chorus line of boos, demanding that NASCAR rescind at least part of the two-inch "no-pow" nose change allowed Chevrolet teams.

"Now you've got to own a Chevrolet because you got everything you ask for if you do," Ford's Jimmy Spencer complained. "This has taken Ford out of the picture." But Martin, one of the men in the best position to judge the situation, demurred when asked, "That would be for NASCAR," he said. "That's not up to me."

Johnny Come Lately

Johnny Benson is off to a good start, thanks to a change of teams

How perfect those days were. He was moving through the ranks at a fast pace. Honors piled high.

Johnny Benson lived his dream. Ever since those days of working on his dad's car, he had a plan — racing cars would be his life.

He was 27 the year he was named the American Speed Association rookie of the year. Three years later, he won the championship.

Benson was on the fast track.

A year after grabbing the ASA title, he earned NASCAR Busch Grand National rookie-of-the-year honors. A season later, he was champion again.

This could get fun.

He continued to power through the ranks. He won Winston Cup rookie honors in 1996, and in 1997 he finished 11th in the points. He was courted by the powerful Roush Racing group. Could things get any better?

Not for a while. It would be 2000 before Benson truly tapped back into his potential.

"I didn't lose any confidence in myself," he says. "But this is such a team sport. It was a situation where things weren't going as well as they needed to be. I could see that things weren't going to get corrected."

■ ■ ■

Benson struggled in the Roush organization. One of five Roush drivers, he worked to find companionship and camaraderie, necessary ingredients for a championship run.

But something was missing. For two years, Benson searched for the answer.

"At that point in time is when I decided to step up and say I was leaving," Benson said.

"I had asked for some things to be changed into a direction that was going to help everybody, and it just didn't seem like it was going in that direction. So I decided to make a change."

Before this season, Benson decided to move to Tim Beverley's fledgling operation with former Roush teammate James Ince as crew chief. The two connected immediately.

They were never among those doubting this new trio would work.

"We've got a really good race team, and Johnny Benson is driving the wheels off," Ince said. "We've got to be very happy with that right now. I guess the good part for us is that we are still being conservative with what we're doing."

Conservative?

They led the Daytona 500 into the closing laps. They've challenged leaders, dodged through traffic,

He and more than once been the team competitor eyed in the garage.

Two weeks ago, many teams said Benson would have been the man to watch had the CareStreet.com 400 at Las Vegas Motor Speedway gone the distance.

But they're not caught in the excitement surrounding their early success. After finishing 14th at Rockingham and sixth at Las Vegas, Benson failed to qualify for last weekend's Cracker Barrel 500 at Atlanta Motor Speedway.

"Can't complain," Benson said when asked about his start.

"We wanted to go down to Daytona, just gather some points, get rid of it and get out of there and had an opportunity to almost win the thing."

■ ■ ■

At Atlanta, Benson was 10th in first-round qualifying, and the second day of qualifying was ruined. Even though he went into the race 11th in points, usually enough to earn a provisional qualifying spot, it was the final weekend that NASCAR was using 1999 points to determine provisionals, so Benson, driving for a new team, was left out.

"We've got to get in a position to where we can go back and race and be comfortable with where we are in the points," Ince said.

"We're points racing right now like we would at the end of the year, but this is an awful strong race team."

During the off-season, Benson visited Beverley's TylerJet shop to see whether he wanted to make the career move. He announced late in the year that he did not plan to return to the Roush fold.

"Coming to the race shop and seeing the quality work they do here is what got me most interested," Benson said.

"But it was late in the year. It was after Atlanta [in November] before we decided to do the deal."

He signed, even though the team had no sponsor.

The contract with Lycos.com came through the night before the Daytona 500. Since then, Benson has been back in form.

"We have an extremely good group of guys here that people probably didn't realize was here," he said.

"It takes a mix of the right people to make things happen on a competitive level, and I believe we have that right now."
