

SIX ARE DEAD IN RAIL CRASH ON ERIE ROAD

Collision Of Passenger Section Into Derailed Freight Is Followed By Blaze

CORNING, N. Y., July 11.—(INS)—Five men were killed outright and another died in the crash here today of a derailed east-bound Erie freight train and passenger train Number 6 from Cleveland. Three cars of the passenger train caught fire and were burned.

The dead are, engineer F. E. Blake, of Hornell, fireman W. J. Latonic, of Saugochanna, Pa. and mail clerks U. A. Fagan of Salamanca and H. M. Hurdout, of Lake and two tenners, who

were riding the freight train. The baggage, express and mail cars of the east-bound passenger train caught fire and were destroyed. Several cars of the freight train

A number of ambulances with doctors and nurses, were rushed to the scene to render first aid treatment.

of continuous through track two miles east of here. The freight car, carrying more than 40 cars, was proceeding on the west bound track when it crashed into some obstacle, resulting in a wreck of cars.

Train Number 6, which had left Cleveland for New York yesterday was going 45 miles an hour when it crashed into the trestle which had been strung

The other burned cars likewise were overturned and the victims had no chance to escape.

None of the 75 passengers was seriously injured, the sleepers resuming on the rails. Several were shaken up but none required

The wrecked passenger train is known as the Lake Cities Express, which left Cleveland at 4:50 P. M.

\$5,000,000 reimbursement bill would be passed as soon as Congress reconvenes.

Declaring that with a single exception, Florida citrus and vegetable products had been given the tariff protection which the state had requested, Mrs. Owen said she worked for and supported the Hawley tariff bill. Criticized for her vote by outsiders, Mrs. Owen said she answered the rebukes with this statement:

"I was sent to Washington to represent my district and to do what my constituents desired. When I have done that I don't care what anyone in any other part of the country has to say about it."

Through her efforts, Mrs. Owen said she made available a million dollars for relief of farmers in the storm area of Florida. She succeeded in having the loan rate per acre raised from \$3 to \$25 for the purchase of seed and fertilizer.

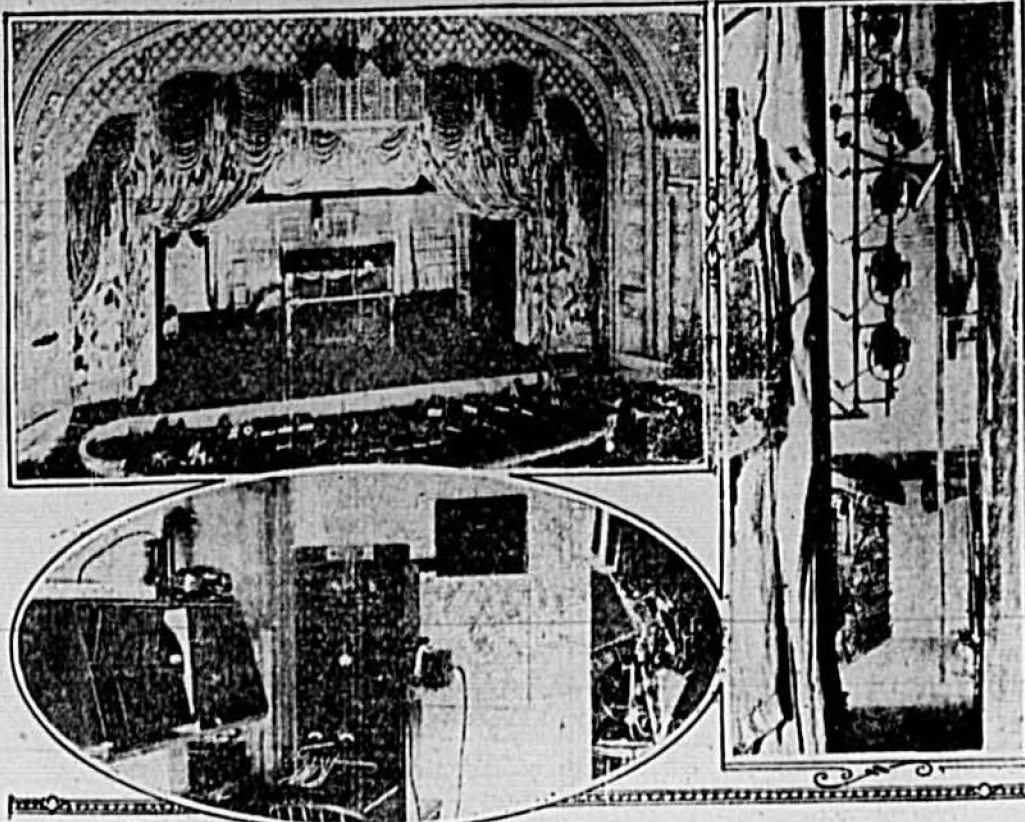

New Philadelphia Theatre Has Complete Sound Equipment

One of the first de luxe picture houses designed primarily for the showing of sound pictures is the Mastbaum Theatre, Philadelphia. To insure full enjoyment of its programs, it employs full broadcasting facilities, complete sound picture equipment and an elaborate sound amplification system.

The theatre stage is equipped with six stage lifts, three orchestra lifts, disappearing footlights, the latest in lighting effects, a special roving system for the film and sound picture projection booth, the film and disc record rooms, cutting and winding rooms, broadcasting studios and Public Address equipment control and monitoring rooms. These open one into the other and occupy the fifth floor of the theatre at an elevation of 83 feet above the stage.

Western Electric Sound System provides for the reproduction of both sound-on-film and sound-on-disc pictures filmed by the leading producers, practically all of which use the Western Electric recording system. This equipment is incorporated in three moving picture projectors. Four horns mounted in towers that can be raised and lowered carry the sound accompaniment of the pictures to the farthest corners of the large house. In addition there is a non-synchronous set for incidental uses including the "sound-in" of silent films.

For entertainers-in-person and for general amplification purposes a Western Electric Public Address System has been installed. So that the horns could be placed most advantageously a special feature of gilded grill work was long in front of the grand curtain near the top of the proscenium arch. Behind this are concealed three public address horns.

These horns have an incidental use. Toward the end of a picture when a stage presentation is to follow, the stage must be made ready, the picture accompaniment can be shut off from the horns on the stage to these accessory horns.

The Public Address system is also used during rehearsal periods when the production manager must be in direct touch with the musicians of the orchestra, the dancers, singers and actors on the stage, as well as the stage and projection booth personnel in the more remote quarters of the theatre. By means of a microphone set up in the vicinity of the twelfth row and boxes which have been installed in strategic spots throughout the house, he can speak in a normal tone of voice into the microphone and reach wherever he pleases without moving from his seat.

Speculation Turns To Utility Stocks In Today's Trading

NEW YORK, July 10. (INS)—

Speculative interest in the stock market today returned to the public utility stocks and high-priced specialties, many of which have been on the inactive list for the last few weeks. Bulls and bears shortly after noon staged a battle royal over Radio, Columbia Graphophone and a few other active shares, the bears carrying off the honors at the start but showing the white feather when the market displayed signs of stiffening.

When the bulls found it impossible to push up the railroad stocks, on the strength of the extremely favorable car-loadings reports, they turned their attention to the utilities. The dwindling market supply of these stocks made concentrating easy, to wear down the bears, who always become alarmed over swiftly rising prices. Consolidated Gas was quick to assume leadership in the utilities, its point jump to 133 1/2 accompanying reports of an early consummation of the New York City utility merger.

Public Service of New Jersey, Columbia Gas and Electric, Standard Gas, North American, National Power and Light and a few others of the June speculative leaders forged to the center of the stage in one of their characteristic brilliant moves. At 3:22 Peoples Gas of Chicago showed a 23-point advance over last week's closing price.

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Son Of Wealthy Man Charged With Fraud

CHICAGO, July 10. (INS)—

A son of one of the wealthiest families in Texas was in a federal detective bureau here today,

charged with having passed fraudulent checks in Chicago, amounting to more than \$25,000.

He is Thomas C. Seymour Botta, 25, whose father, Thomas H. Botta, is general counsel for the Southern Pacific Railroad at Houston. Police wired the latter and received a reply that the family refused to aid the young man further. Deputy Police Commissioner Stege said.

Lindbergh Predicts Fleet Of Planes Like Pullman Cars

LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 10. (INS)—

Fleets of airplanes instead of single ships will leave on schedule to accommodate increased air travel in the future, and will be fitted up like pullmans for night flying if the visualization of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh comes true.

"We are looking forward to this increase with confidence in the public's reaction to flying," he said here today before taking off for San Francisco. "I believe this increase will be proportionate to the volume of business done by the railroads. There never will be any competition between the two methods of transportation."

"When now only one plane leaves its terminal, the business will increase to such an extent that whole fleets will leave on schedule. In the near future we will eliminate the train travel between Clovis, N. M., and Waynesville, Okla., and fly direct to Clovis, Okla., from Los Angeles. This will reduce the air-rail time between Los Angeles to New York to 36 hours. The cost of air travel will be reduced proportionately as the business grows."

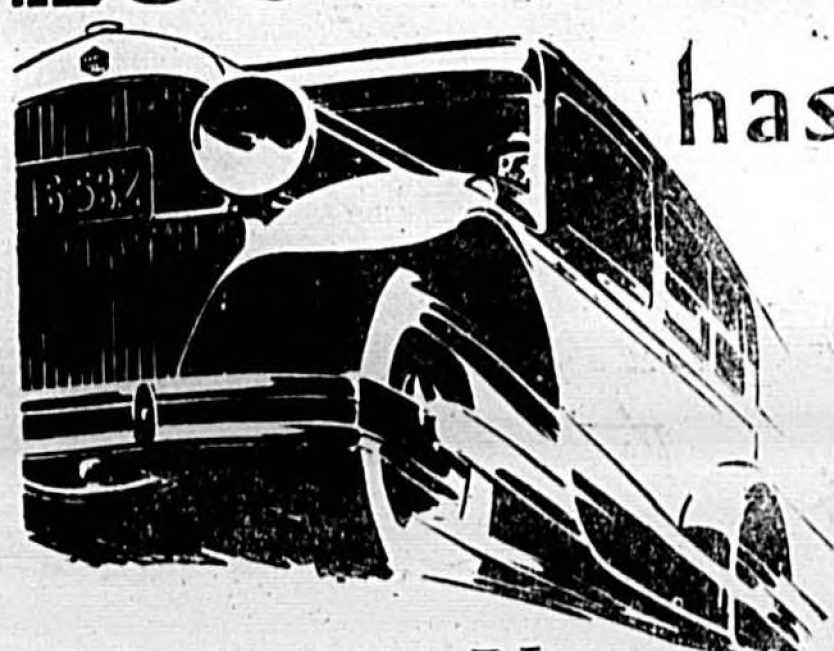
Wives Of Airmen Are Elated Over Arrival

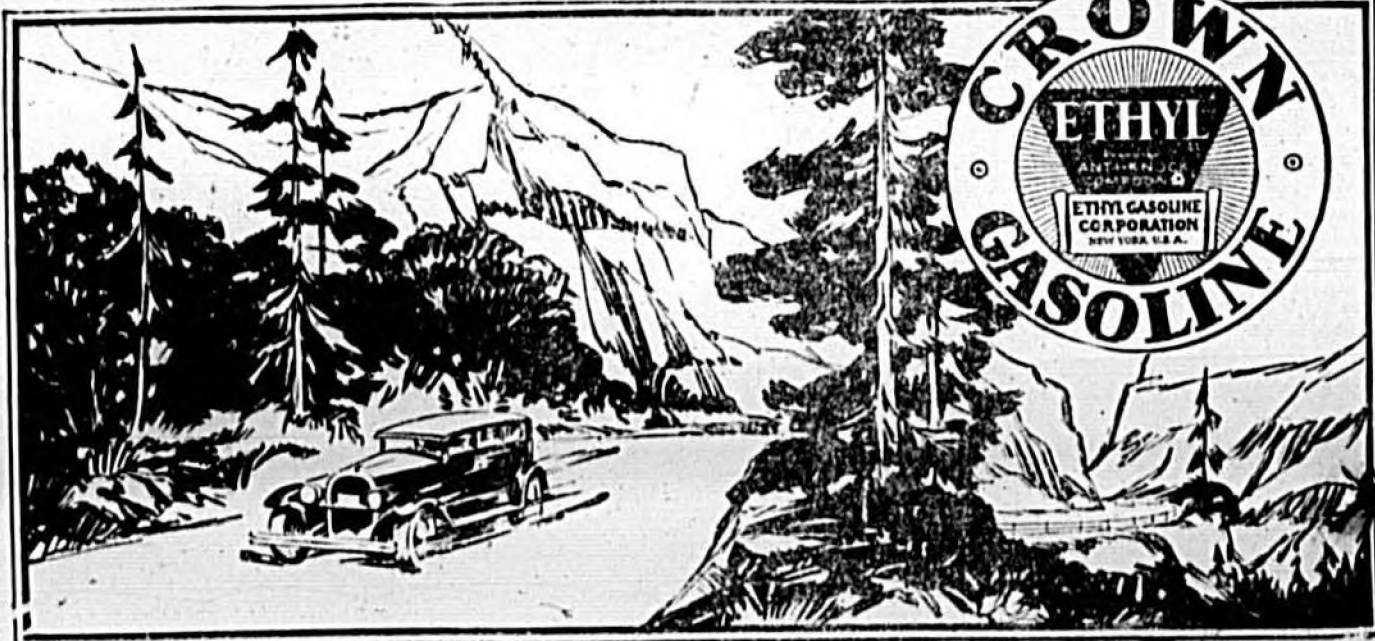

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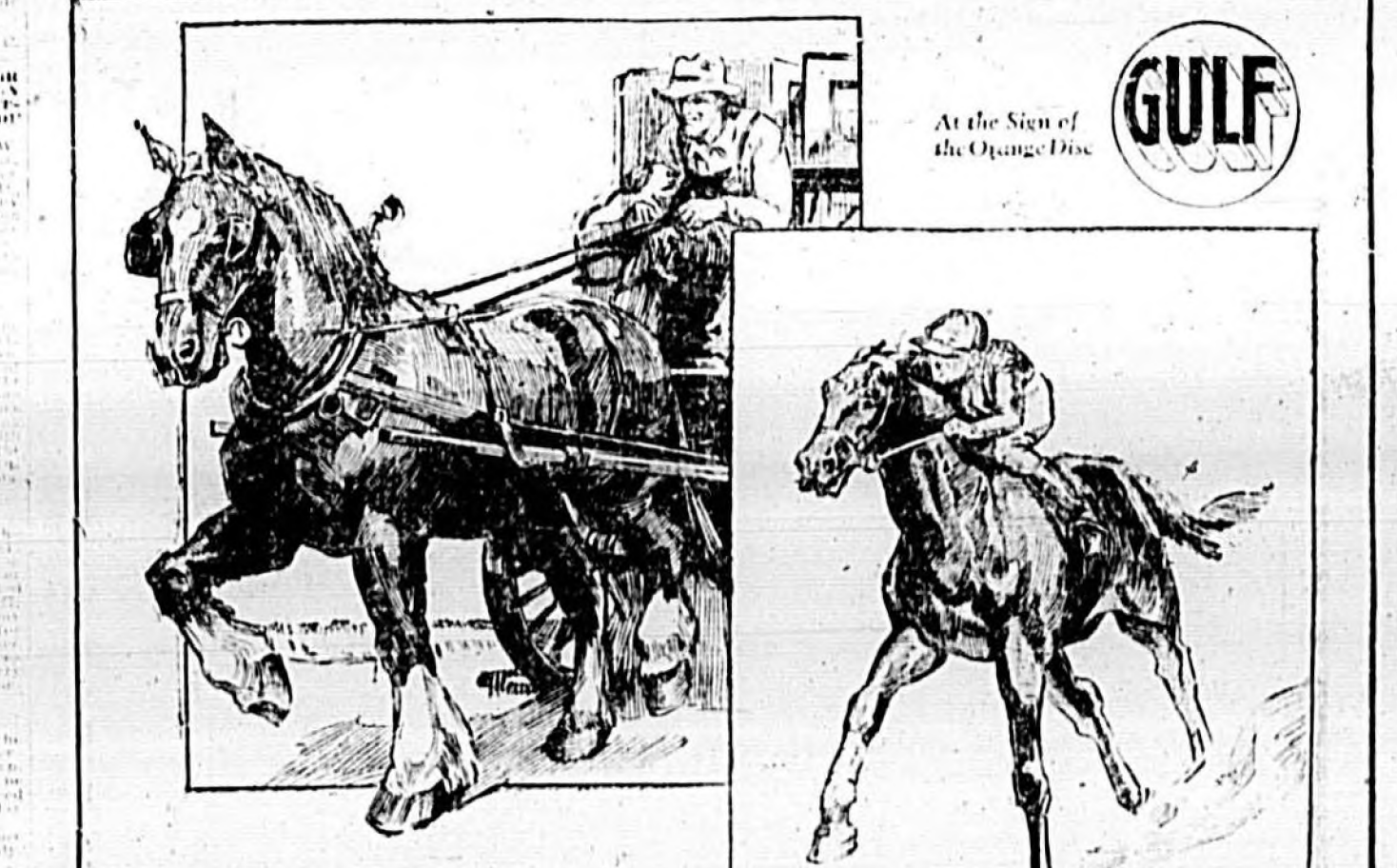
