

Florida's qualified electors who go to the polls Nov. and will be asked to approve or disapprove the School Construction Bond amendment to the state's constitution.

This amendment, basically, extends to the year 2,000 the bond program which is now providing funds for public school construction.

The amendment would continue the present method of repaying the bonds through revenues derived from the licensing of motor vehicles. It also increases the maximum bond interest rate from four to four and a half per cent and provides an additional method of determining instruction units for the purpose of distributing the fund

Thomas D. Bailey, state superin-tendent of public instruction, said recently, "No single action of the state, since the establishment of the Minimum Foundation Program in 1947, has been of more significance in meeting the crucial needs of Florida education than the school capital outlay amendment.'

Bailey continued, "I shudder to think of what the situation would be today had not this amendment been in effect. . . . Keeping pace with Florida's continuing growth in enrollment and the pressing needs of school buildings must be a continuous effort in this space age year of 1964. To fail to meet these needs would be to abdicate our mutual responsibility to the boys and girls of our state. We dare not falter. . . ."

The Sanford Herald agrees with Superintendent Bailey that extending the school capital outlay amendment is a must if we are to provide the buildings demanded by enrollment increases and by expanding educational programs.
