## Candidates Pause Before Final Drive

By United Press International Democratic and Republican candidates paused today to catch up on business and hold strategy sessions before hitting the trail for the final two weeks of the campaign. President Johnson, after spending the weekend occupied by recent events in the Communist world, held a White House briefing today on the developments for congressional leaders of both parties. The only candidate not in Washington was Republican vice presidential nominee Hubert H. Humphrey, who cancelled two speeches in Florida to attend the session. He was scheduled to fly to Ardmore, Okla., tonight to resume campaigning. Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, the GOP presidential nominee, continued to rest at his Washington apartment and meet with his aides. Goldwater will make a one-day swing through Maryland Tuesday and foray into Pennsylvania the following day. Dean Burch called on the networks to provide Goldwater with air time tonight. Johnson's meeting with legislative leaders followed his address on nationwide television Sunday night on the changes in the Soviet government and the explosion of a Red Chinese nuclear device. Republicans demanded Goldwater be given equal time to reply. GOP National Chairman

## Talk By Taste Successful Aid To Handicapped

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. (UPI) — Talk by "tasting" may help handicapped children speak normally.

Eugene T. McDonald, research professor of the speech and hearing clinic of the Pennsylvania State University, is advancing oral stereognosis, the identification of shapes in the mouth. These tests are being given to cerebral palsy victims and "normal" children.

Penn State scientists are exploring the theory that articulation is controlled by patterns of sensations arising from sound, touch and feeling of movement.

McDonald's book, to be published this fall, explains that "defective sensation and perception in the oral cavity (mouth) is very likely an important cause of poor speech."

He wrote that crippling conditions such as cerebral palsy can impair the ability of sensation.

For the tongue-testing, McDonald uses three-dimensional plastic stars, triangles, half-moons and circles smaller than a dime. The designs also include other familiar shapes such as a ball, a square, a doughnut, a cross and a horseshoe.

Copies of the 25 objects are placed on a black cloth before the child. McDonald or one of his graduate students selects one of the originals at random.

A sterilized form, attached on a short piece of wire to prevent swallowing, is placed in the child's mouth without allowing the child to see it. The child is then asked to identify the form from the way it feels on his tongue.

Under a grant by the National Institutes of Health, McDonald will study groups of "normal" children of several grade levels in Pennsylvania public schools to determine their abilities for identifying the plastic "tongue-testing" forms.

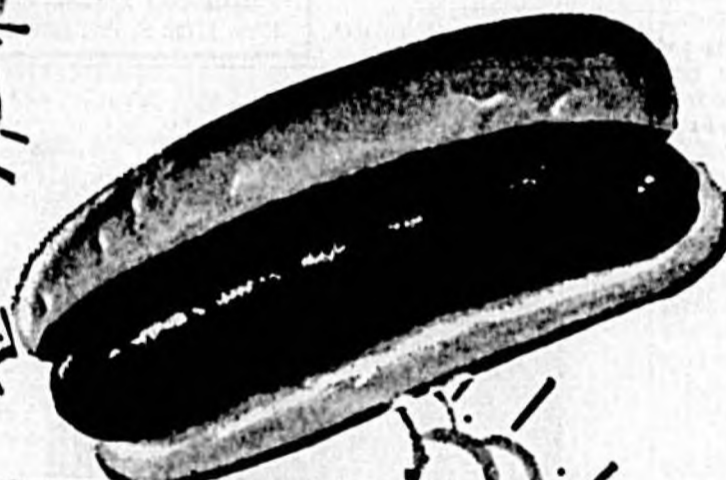

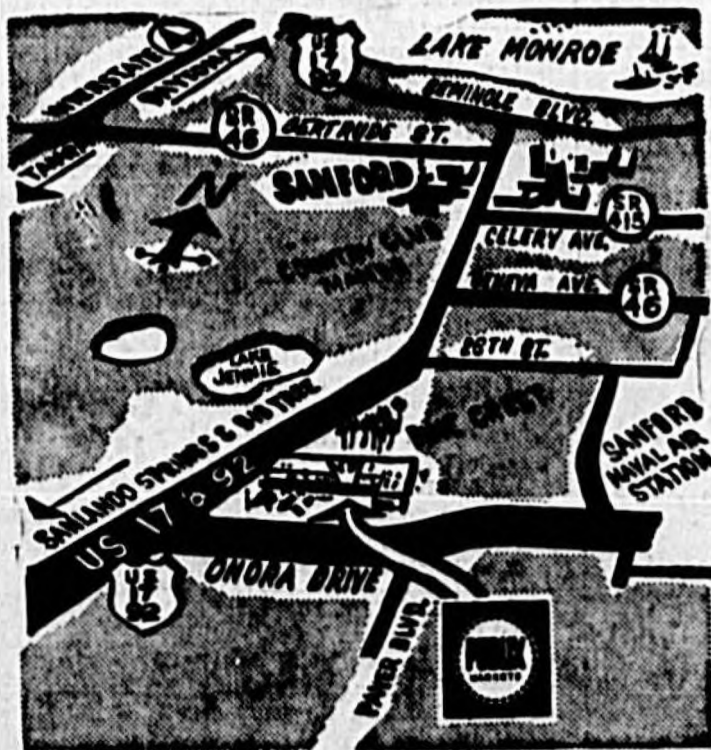

# Russia Opening 'Back Door' To China Peace Talks?

## Bulletins

NEW YORK (UPI) — Johnny Keane, who quit as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals the day after they defeated the New York Yankees in the World Series, today signed a one-year contract to manage the Yankees. The move was unprecedented in baseball history.

The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce today advised homeowners to use care and discrimination in hiring a firm to prevent or control termite infestation. John Krider, executive manager of the Chamber, said many responsible companies offer effective termite control but warned that panic buying and a general lack of awareness on the part of homeowners have led to the rise of an unscrupulous or incompetent fringe element in the field.

Noting that termite damage runs into millions of dollars each year, he said these unethical operators employ scare tactics to prey on the gullible and seldom provide the termite control or protection that they promise.

According to the National Better Business Bureau, with which the Chamber is affiliated through membership, the National Pest Control Association has set forth the following guidelines for homeowners:

1. Don't panic if you find that termites have invaded your house. Termite damage usually develops slowly so there is no need to rush to purchase termite control services.
2. Deal with a reliable firm and check its references. Also, seek the advice of the Better Business Bureau, Chamber of Commerce, County Agricultural Agent or State College of Agriculture.
3. Be wary of the firm that quotes a price based on the amount of chemicals used, or a price far below the bids of other termite control services contacted.

## U. S. Facing Period Of Uncertainty

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The view of the international scene from the State Department's antiseptically modern headquarters in the "foggy bottom" section of Washington is murkier than usual.

The impression is that the United States faces a prolonged period of uncertainty in dealing with friend and foe alike after the ouster of Nikita Khrushchev, China's nuclear blast and Britain's indecisive election.

Most officials seem to feel they are dealing with "stop-gap" regimes in Russia and Britain. And they are not at all certain of the ultimate effect of Red China's nuclear success on the shifting world scene.

Authorities are inclined to believe that the team selected by the Kremlin hierarchy to fill Khrushchev's shoes is transitional. Premier Alexei N. Kosygin and party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev are expected to follow present policy lines while the collective leadership reviews strategy to cope with Russia's mounting foreign and domestic problems.

Some officials believe Nikolai Podgorny, a powerful secretary in the Presidium, eventually will emerge as the single leader. Others are inclined to believe it will be Mikhail Suslov, the party's chief theoretician who survived both Stalin and Khrushchev.

The thin majority held by British Prime Minister Harold Wilson's new Labor government is considered here to indicate it will have a relatively short life expectancy.

Arrangements are being made for Wilson to confer in Washington shortly after the Nov. 3 election with the President. This is being done in the first place because Wilson is anxious to make the trip and, secondly, to reaffirm the basic Anglo-American solidarity which exists no matter which party is in power.

Officials acknowledge, however, that Wilson will be in no position to make any decisions on the nuclear strategy differences dividing the two countries. The assumption here is that he knows the Conservatives will give him a few months in which to become bogged down in Britain's financial problems before forcing a showdown vote which most probably will bring new elections.

Johnson naturally welcomed the assurance by the new Soviet leaders that they would continue Khrushchev's policy of seeking to lower tensions. However, it is recognized that this may only be a Soviet effort to avoid rocking the boat on East-West affairs while deciding what to do about the two problems which apparently caused Khrushchev's fall—domestic economic dislocation and the growing chaos in world communism stemming from Moscow's dispute with Peking.

## Lloyd T. Brown To Be Sworn In

Lloyd T. Brown will be sworn in as a member of the Village Council of North Orlando Wednesday evening during a special meeting of the board which has been called for 7:30 p.m.

Brown will replace Councilman Arthur Ferrin who recently moved from North Orlando. Brown was selected to complete Ferrin's unexpired term by unanimous action of the remaining Council members.

During the special session, the Council will also discuss gas rates and plans for a general clean-up of the area.

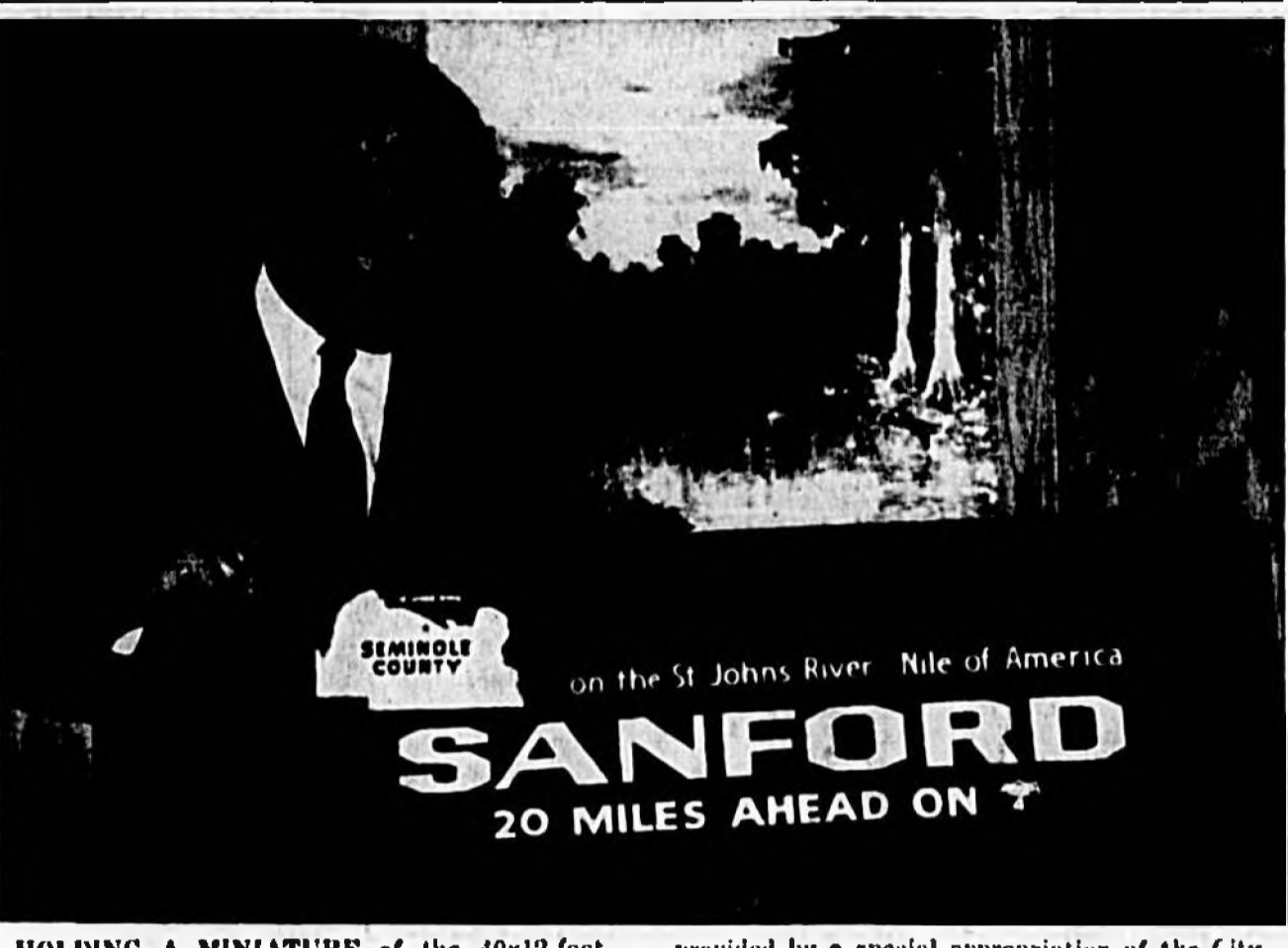

## Herbert Hoover Dies



Herbert Hoover, 81st President of the United States and public servant to the world, died today. He was 90.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Herbert Clark Hoover, 81st President of the United States and public servant to the world, died today. He was 90.

The former Republican chief executive who occupied the White House from 1929 to 1933 succumbed to the last of a long series of grave ailments at 11:35 a. m., EDT. Death came at his Waldorf Towers apartment.

He was stricken last Saturday with bleeding in his upper gastrointestinal tract and failed to rally.

Physicians said the bleeding had caused an accumulation of toxic products in Hoover's bloodstream which the elder statesman could not overcome. This morning his heart began to fail.

At his bedside were his two children, Herbert Hoover Jr., former under secretary of state, and Allan Hoover. Hoover's wife, Lou Henry Hoover, died in 1941.

Hoover, one of the great humanitarianists of World War I and the post war period, lived for years in the shadow of the disastrous economic depression which occurred during his administration. But he emerged again in World War II and its aftermath as a revered participant in domestic and world affairs.

Hoover, who was 90 last August 10, had the distinction of living longer as an ex-president than any other chief executive, although John Adams lived six months longer in his 90th year than Hoover. His death left only two former presidents—Harry S. Truman and Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Hoover had been more or less inactive since last February when he was bedded by an old kidney ailment and a respiratory condition. He had his gall bladder removed in 1958, underwent surgery for a growth in his bowel in 1962, and was stricken by anemia and intestinal bleeding in 1963.

His survival after each of these setbacks was described by physicians as "miraculous."

Through it all Hoover continued work on the fourth and final volume of his autobiography, "An American Epic," his 30th book. It was published last May.

The "grand old man of the Grand Old Party" was born a blacksmith's son and rose to fame and fortune as a mining engineer.

He had a distinguished career of public service behind him when he was elected to succeed President Calvin Coolidge in 1929, defeating Gov. Al Smith of New York. He had served in the cabinets of Presidents Warren Harding and Coolidge.

## Woman Bilked In Termite Racket

A Sanford woman told police yesterday she was bilked out of \$600 by two men posing as state inspectors and who said her home was "about to fall down" due to termites.

She said she agreed to let them treat the home. When the two men had finished, she was told not to enter the home for several minutes due to the lingering poison gas.

She waited, then went inside and discovered no odor.

The local resident then called Jacksonville authorities to see if they had such inspectors in the area. She was told they did not.

She then called her bank only to learn the check had been cashed; the men had disappeared.

Police received a description of the two men. One was listed as six feet tall, slender build, with a black mustache and wearing a gray suit. The other was five-foot, six inches tall, fat and was wearing a striped shirt and dark trousers, the woman reported.

## 3 Indictments Handed Down

Three indictments were handed up by a local grand jury which was convened here yesterday.

Indicted on charges of statutory rape were returned against Jimmy Lee Drumright, 17, and Robert L. Beasley, also 17. The charge involved a 14-year-old girl.

Arthur Will Jones, 34, was indicted on a charge of second degree murder involving the shooting of Nathan Victor on June 5.

The jurors were recessed but will remain intact through Nov. 3, court authorities said, in the event other matters requiring their attention should arise.

## Peking: It's Soviet Move

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union's new leadership apparently is opening a back door for talks with Communist China, Western diplomats said today.

They said the firing of Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev makes a renewal of talks with Peking possible, because the Chinese had called openly for his dismissal as a condition for better relations.

But the diplomats saw little chance that Khrushchev's successors, Communist party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev and Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, could easily solve the differences between the two Communist powers.

In London, qualified Chinese sources indicated Monday night that Peking is in no hurry to come to terms with the Soviets and wants them to make the first move. They said the explosion of a Chinese nuclear device has reinforced Peking's prestige and may have hardened its position.

Diplomats in London said the most to be expected from Moscow-Peking talks at this time would be a propaganda truce.

Despite the poor prospects of success, diplomats in Moscow feel a resumption of the talks would bring Brezhnev and Kosygin at least two advantages.

One is that they would win time to map new tactics against Peking's bid for world Communist leadership.

The other is the favorable reaction that could be expected from some of the Communist leaders in Eastern Europe, who felt Khrushchev went too far too fast in his quarrel with the Chinese.

Both Moscow and Peking were talking unity. Chinese Communist Chief Mao Tse-tung Monday expressed the wish that the two parties would unite "on the basis of Marxism-Leninism."

Brezhnev made a similar appeal at a rally for the three new Soviet spacemen.

But the diplomats said that the ideological differences between the two parties are now so great that there is no easy way to achieve unity.

## Red Forces Routed In South Viet Nam

SAIGON (UPI)—South Vietnamese government troops chased down and killed 35 Communist guerrillas in a running battle ending this afternoon 70 miles southwest of Saigon, a U. S. military spokesman reported.

One of the first casualties of the action that began Monday was a U. S. free lance photographer, James H. Pickrell of Wilmington, Ohio. Pickrell was wounded in the leg.

Successful conclusion of the battle was reported shortly after disclosure that a clothing plant making camouflage battle dress for Communist guerrillas had been found operating in Saigon's Chinatown. Police promptly closed the plant.

A U. S. spokesman said American helicopters played a key role in the running fight in which only one government soldier was reported killed and 13 wounded. Four Communist weapons were captured.

Government reinforcements were flown into the fighting area aboard U. S. Army helicopters.

"It was an excellent operation, one of the best I've seen in this province," said Capt. Charles T. Brown, 30, of Easton, Pa., who flew the first helicopter.

Brown's copilot was Capt. John E. Laughlinhouse, 32, of Jonesboro, Ark. The American helicopter pilots were commanded by Maj. George L. Young, 32, of Colorado Springs, Colo.

## Holley Promises New 'Bombshell'

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Republican candidate Charles Holley, lashing at opponent Hayden Burns, called a press conference here today saying he had another "bombshell" to drop in Florida's hot gubernatorial race.

Holley said he would fly to the capital from his home in St. Petersburg for a 2:30 p.m. news conference at which he would make the new announcement.

Last week, Holley charged that Burns had \$1.2 million in cash in a Nassau bank and although Burns refuted this with solid evidence, Holley attacked the Jacksonville mayor on a side issue Monday.

In a statement released at Holley's headquarters in St. Petersburg, the GOP candidate charged that, in effect, his opponent had said that anyone who can't write a check for \$12,000 on any given day is a failure.

## Canal Directors Meet Thursday

Directors of the St. Johns-Indian River Canal District are scheduled to meet in Titusville at noon Thursday, according to an announcement today by Chairman John Krider.

The session will be held at the Chanticleer Restaurant, south of Titusville on U. S. 1. Krider said the purpose of the meeting will be to adopt a budget, elect officers and transact any other business which may come before the Board.

## Bulb Sale To Begin Monday

Howard Hood, president of the Sanford Lions Club, announced today that the organization's annual light bulb sale will begin in Sanford Monday.

Hood said that members of the club will sell the bulbs on a house-to-house basis during evening hours next week and made a plea today for residents to support the sale.

Proceeds from the sale are used to help defray the cost of the club's program of assistance to the blind.

## Sanford Man Faces Trial In Slaying

Herbert Turner, 38, of Sanford, has been returned to DeLand to stand trial on a murder count lodged after a fishing camp dispute on the St. Johns River last May.

Turner was arrested recently in Atlanta by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and returned to DeLand yesterday.

He is charged in connection with the slaying of Floyd Dodson of Paola, Walter Payne, 40, of Sanford is also charged in the indictment. He is still at large.

Dodson's badly beaten body was found floating in the river near Crimm's Fish Camp. Payne, Turner and Dodson were staying at a camp bungalow.
