INSURGENTS IN SENATE FIGHT NEW BANK BILL

Steps May Be Taken Soon To Reduce The Number Of Carnivals Visiting Sanford

That action toward limiting the
number of carnivals and traveling
shows in the city and county may
be attempted by local business interests
within the next few weeks is said to be evident by the number of complaints reaching the ears of
city and county authorities. The
increasing number of itinerant
shows and carnivals which have
stopped in the county and city
within the past few weeks have
caused many business men consider-
able worry, it is said.

Recent petty thefts and burglaries
have been laid to followers of
these carnivals and shows, both by
authorities and by business houses,
who claim that an undesirable ele-
ment usually travel with the shows
and live by thievery.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—Some-
what heralding the famous battle
of Andrew Jackson against the
United States Bank, Senate insur-
gents today waged war against
further extension of the federal
banking system by opposing enact-
ment of the McFadden-Pepper
branch banking act.

Jackson drove the U. S. bank
out of existence, but the insurgents
faced almost certain defeat.

A closure petition, signed by 58
Senators, lay on the desk of Vice
President Dawes to be submitted
to the Senate at 1 o'clock, tomor-
row, for a vote on the question of
shutting off the further debate.

At supporters of the bill com-
mended more than enough votes to obtain

a closure, a final vote enacting the
bill will be taken by the Senate
sometime Wednesday. It then

will go to the president.

The action of the banking lead-
ers in actual invoking closure for
the third time in the present gen-
eration created considerable bad
feeling. Opponents of the bill
charged the measure was being
"railroaded" through Congress and
that they were being "steam-rol-
led."

The provisions of the bill, which
will have a far-reaching influence
upon American banks, are:

1. Granting and intermediate
charter to the federal reserve system
and all its banks, thus substitut-
ing an "all time" charter for the
existing one, which expires in
1934.

2. Permitting national banks to
engage in the investment business,
by which they can use savings de-
posits—under certain conditions—
to purchase real estate.

3. Allowing national banks to
establish branch banks within the
limits of the city in which the parent
bank is located, if the state
laws permit branch banking by
state banks.

4. Allowing a state bank, which
has branch banks "up-state" or
outside the city in which the parent
bank is located, to bring all these
branches into the federal system
if the state bank becomes a national
bank.

It is believed that a gang of
traveling crooks has been attempting

Ronnie Williamson, 16 year old

Previous efforts to locate the

from the youth's head had to be re-
moved, it was thought impossible
for him to survive.

The case is an exceptional one,
according to medical authorities,
and the success of the operation,
which was performed Friday was
awaited with much interest by mem-
bers of the profession, who pro-
nounced it one of the most delicate
in history. The bullet was imbed-
ded almost four inches in the brain
and its removal came after several
attempts to locate it proved un-
successful. It was grooved and
knocked shapeless by the impact
with the skull.

to leave the hospital Wednesday, unless complications set in accord-
ing to Dr. Stevens.

Dr. Percy Grant Dies
After An Operation

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—(INS)—
Churchmen today mourned the
death of Rev. Percy Stickney
Grant, one of the leading moder-
nists in the Protestant Episcopal
Church. He died Sunday following
an operation for appendicitis. Fun-
eral services will be held to-mor-
row.

Dr. Grant had a remarkable career.
In 1885 he came to New York
City as rector of the staid and
orthodox Church of the Ascension,
a constituency of wealth and culture,
where his radical and unconven-
tional ideas involved him in a se-
ries of controversies with Bishop
Manning and other prominent
churchmen.

Dr. Grant repudiated the doc-
trine of the virgin birth, declar-
ing that the church "would be better off
without it."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(INS)—The
government today opened up its heavy artillery

treasury's assessment of over \$10,
