### DELANEY IS EASY FOE FOR BOSTON HEAVY ASPIRANT

David Falls To Win A Single Round Against Goliath, Says Walsh; Fight Attracts Crowd Of Twenty Thousand

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—The contumacious Goliath to play tonight to his David at Madison Square Garden last night but some danger muffed the script. ## NUMBER OF BANK FAILURES IN 1926 BREAKS RECORDS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—On a year of remarkable prosperity 1926 broke a counter-wave of unprecedented bank failures, according to figures made public today by the federal reserve board, which in 1926, chiefly as the result of agricultural casualties in the south and middle west, 945 banks failed, with a total of \$397,247,000.

The last year's bank failures, with deposits of \$635,000,000, were the highest since both 1924 and 1925, a year of the banking difficulties, never, treasury officials found powerful argument for extension of national and federal reserve banking systems. Out of the total failures for the three years on 1926 represented member banks of the federal reserve system, 1,124, 755 non-member banks, 1,000 national banks and 35 state member banks collapsed. Figures showing what percent responded with out-look to depositors are not available.

The outstanding features of the 1926 banking situation were the failure of ninety-seven institutions in the Atlanta Federal Reserve district in July. Most of these were in Georgia and Florida. In the year the southern cotton situation also caused trouble for the banks in the Richmond, Dallas and Dallas districts.

The principal year's trouble centered in the agricultural regions of the Minneapolis district where 283 banks failed. In failures were reported in the San and New York districts. Philadelphia district had three failures and the San Francisco district eight. Failures in other districts were:

Chicago, 181; Atlanta, 158; Kansas City, 110; St. Louis, 76; Richmond, 63; Dallas, 50.

Estimated losses over 60 per cent the failures as among banks of less than \$25,000 capitalization. It is noted that the proportion of all banks is largest in the regions where majority of failures occurred.

In the first three weeks of this year, 93 banks with \$25,000,000 deposits suspended operation; 72 non-member, 14 national, and 7 state member banks.

Commercial failures reported by a board during 1926 numbered 1,233, a slight increase over 1925, though the liabilities of \$409,000,000 were less than the year before.

The New York district reported 1,956 commercial failures and Chicago, 2,105. Philadelphia made the best record with 790 failures, followed by Dallas with 881 and St. Louis with 815.
