## SEARCH FOR TWO AIRMEN HALTED BY BAD WEATHER

Little Hope Felt For Harris  
And Gray, Young Army Air-

SEASIDE PARK, N. J., Feb. 19.—(INS)—Strong winds accompa-  
nied by heavy rain and a very  
rough sea caused officials of the  
fifth coast guard district to aban-  
don hope of rescuing Lieuts.  
Willard J. Harris and William A.  
Gray, army flyers who left Mitch-  
ell Field, N. Y., in a Dc Haviland air-  
plane Thursday afternoon for Lan-  
gley Field, Va., and are believed to  
have fallen into the sea near here.  
A dense fog still hung over the  
coast this morning.

Pieces of a wing propeller parts

have been found in the water near  
Island Park. Included were wood  
in strips, strips of fabric, and two  
wheels.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Feb. 19.—(INS)—The last minute stay of  
execution granted Rufus Chester, youthful slayer of his sweetheart,  
brought the wrath of Governor  
John W. Martin down upon  
him in Justice to the county Com-  
missioners.

Governor Martin, upon hearing  
of the stay of execution granted  
Chester yesterday afternoon, re-  
called that he was the sixth person  
whose execution was stayed since  
the governor had signed nine  
death warrants on Dec. 28—one a week.

Our jails are full of people who  
have been convicted of wilful  
murder and sentenced to death four  
years ago, and each time when the law is attempted to  
be enforced by the executive some  
way comes along and stays it.

"We have men in our jails who  
have committed rape and were  
sentenced to death three years ago  
and their execution since has been  
stayed by writs.

"Men convicted of cold-blooded  
murder and of rape are crowding  
our jails and yet we talk of law  
enforcement," governor Martin said.

"When the executive tries to enforce  
the laws in obedience to an  
announcement made last night,  
this morning, entry blank is made

to practically every jailor  
and the attorney, according to Mr.

## DELANEY IS EASY FOE FOR BOSTON HEAVY ASPIRANT

**David Fails To Win A Single Round Against Goliath, Says Walsh; Fight Attracts Crowd of Twenty Thousand**

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—The contest called for Goliath to play straight to his David at Madison Square Garden last night but some bunglers muffed the script. He sent Dave out there without his sling shot and Goliath without his temple and in the natural course of events, Jimmy Maloney was declared the winner over Jack Delaney in a costly barren of competition.

This was the contest that was to make indoor fight history and it did. It induced New York to throw half million dollars in some one's till to witness a monumental flop.

Everyone knows that Goliath always was a sap from a sling shot to the temple. It was a one-sided, lopsided bout, affair with Delaney outclassed from start to finish and never a dive or blow struck. Otherwise it would be natural to expect that he would have had his man on the floor at least once during ten rounds.

## Fight For Reapportionment Of House Will Be Renewed At Next Session, Says Fenn

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—The national House of Representatives, with 102 members, will become an even larger body unless public opinion is induced to half its representation in that direction, Representative Fenn (R) of Connecticut, chairman of the House Census Committee, declared today.

Fenn said that he would renew his fight for a reapportionment of the House in the next session of Congress.

Unless a scientific reapportionment is made, he asserted, the

present unequal representation of larger cities and industrial centers will become even more pronounced in the future.

"There is a very pronounced demand for a large house, despite the fact that the present body is unwieldy," he said. "Proponents of a large house point to the English Parliament, and say that only all of the bills are proposed by the ministers. Here there is more independence. We do not follow leadership blindly."

"The thickly populated centers of the country now have an unequal representation and the longer a reapportionment is delayed the

more disproportionate it will become."

Fenn pointed out that many congressmen represent districts with less than 200,000 population and others are named by a constituency of more than 800,000 under the present apportionment.

The failure to gain a redistribution bill in the House has been represented by many states' delegations in Congress, including Michigan.
