"This port is now deader than a doornail," said a waterfront spokesman. commission spokesman after the one-day stoppage by the International Longshoremen's Association began this morning. It was the nation's worst port tie-up since the ILA strike in 1959.

The longshorsmen and up to 120,000 members of 26 other unions planned a mass meeting at Battery Park. It was called to focus attention on the national maritime strike by five seafarers unions, now in its sixth day. The ILA called its members off

the job to protest pay losses suffered because the longshoremen have been refusing to cross the meafarer's picket lines.

They claim the striker's themselves are "enduring little hardship, sitting aboard ship, relaxing and eating three meals a day." "We don't like it and this is our

way of telling them so," said an ILA official.

The work stoppage tied up 50 ships in New York Harbor, many of them foreign flag vessels that ad not been previously affected by the strike against American shipping companies. Approximately 85 American ships already were idle in Atlantic, Gulf and West coast ports, their cargoes untouch-
